

ROSEVILLE COMMUNITY SCHOOLS EXPANDS GSRP EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAM

This fall, Roseville Community Schools bolstered their Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP), increasing the early childhood learning to five days a week. Additionally, transportation is now provided for students who live within the Roseville district.

Assistant Superintendent Dave Rice said that the increase to five days a week from the previous four days was driven from the state level to increase class time. "We have

been observing the differences in kindergarten preparedness for years and it is always consistent. GSRP students from the previous year are substantially ahead of most other students in socialization, behavioral norms, and play/interaction with other students. We may not have a defined metric to measure all of the factors, but student performance and

educator observation over the years has been consistent." Sarrah Hovis, lead GSRP teacher at Fountain, said that the added day each week will not only give the students more opportunities for learning, building relationships, and having fun at school, but it also provides them added consistency. "On a Friday in

previous years, the children had many different situations stay home with parents, go to a family member's house, or even daycare for one day. Now they have another day of routine, consistency, learning, and meals. It's comforting for the children to know where they are going and who they are going to be with for five full days."

GSRP is funded through an increase in per pupil allotment for preschool-aged students. The district currently offers the program at three different locations. "We currently have three classes at Green Elementary, three at Fountain Elementary, and two at Kment Elementary. A fourth class will be opening soon at Green, giving us a total of nine classrooms and 144 students. We are one of the largest GSRP programs in the county," Rice said.

Hovis added that the Great Start Readiness Program

is important to young learners because they are learning to be good students before they go to kindergarten. "The children practice how to listen and follow directions, build self-esteem, pay attention, and grow independently all year long." She added that the teachers also offer the students new experiences and let them discover and explore the world around them through hands-on activities and play.

> "We work hard with the children to build a nurturing community where everyone feels safe and can share their ideas and feelings freely. All these factors prepare our youngest learners for success for the years to come."

> The GSRP classes use a structured course called Creative Curriculum. "Some of the key skills the children experience are learning

through play, how to be a good friend, take turns, wait patiently, build positive relationships with teachers and children, problem-solve, make choices, social skills, an introduction to early academic skills in math and literacy, and strengthening gross motor and fine motor skills," said Hovis. Rice added that students are encouraged to challenge their minds as well as their fine and gross

motor skills in GSRP. "This promotes self-confidence, selfesteem, and self-expression. All children are accepted as unique individuals." GSRP classes are capped at 16 students and each are taught by a certified teacher and a certified associate teacher. To be eligible for the free GSRP preschool program, students must meet at least two risk factors as determined by the MDE. Students must be a Macomb County resident and must turn four on or before September 1.

In the end, it helps build a better culture at school, which helps to improve attendance. However, recess must be done right. The addition of a second recess must be structured - all students engaged and involved with other students, with strict supervision of the activity to prevent negative

Students working with peers in a positive environment will reduce anxiety and depression and help in, such as students enrolling, sorting out build a sense of belonging. All students want to feel they belong and welcomed in their classroom.

> Recess is not the only thing we will be working on to improve attendance. Other initiatives include Engaging Parents and Students, Safer Walk to School, Restorative Practices, and providing more summer learning and after-school strategies.

> What is going to help the most is when the home values the opportunities education gives their child. Children learn better when they come to school regularly. The more they are at school, the higher their achievement will be. Attendance matters!

GET TO KNOW OUR TEACHERS




ALEXIS VANDAMME - KMENT ELEMENTARY
